- 3) write about their own everyday life.

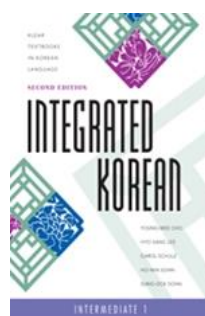
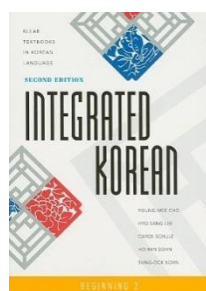

## Expectations of Students

1. **Attend all of the classes:** four hours per week. Failure to attend and participate in 60% or more of the classes will result in the student **forfeiting the 14%** participation percentage.
2. **Come prepared for each class:** 1) **read over the textbook content** to be covered, specified in the **schedule**. 2) **Turn off your phone:** no photos are to be taken during class.
3. **Avoid private talking.**
4. Do your **homework** after each class. Homework consists of
  - a. Exercises on **Canvas**
  - b. Textbook Exercises for each grammar point, Comprehension Questions for Conversations 1 and 2, and Narration that are not covered in class, and
  - c. Workbook Exercises of the corresponding lessons.
5. **Access Canvas** regularly, do the **exercises on Canvas** and check **announcements, guidelines for tests and presentations**, etc.
6. **Use Information and Communications Technology** (E.G. CLASS FACEBOOK)

7. **Tests**
  - 1) The tests will be held where classes are usually held, during the normal class hours.
